## **Scattergories**

## To Get Started:


- One member of the breakout group should be selected as "leader" who will share their screen with the rest of the participants.
- The leader then logs on the website, <a href="https://swellgarfo.com/scattergories/">https://swellgarfo.com/scattergories/</a>.
- The player will share their screen with the rest of the group in the breakout room. To share the
  screen, scroll down to the center of the video and click on the button labeled "Share Screen."
  Clicking it will bring up a variety of options to choose from. Select the screen with the
  Scattergories browser window to share with the group.
- In the upper middle of the screen in the box labeled "Categories" push the minus sign and lower the number of categories to six (1).



- Click on the "Restart" button on the right side of the screen (2).
- Hit the "Play" button to begin the game (3).
- If you have a repeat letter, you can click on the "re-roll" button on the upper right of the "Letter" box (4).

## **How To Play:**

- The goal of Scattergories is to create a list of original words related to the random categories provided in the game that start with a selected letter (5). The person with the highest score wins the game.
- At the start of the game, a number of random categories will be displayed on the screen (6). Each person must write down a statement or object that corresponds with the topic with the letter for the round. For example, if the category is "Celebrities" and the letter is "H" participants would write down words like "Harrison Ford" or "Hellen Keller."



- After the allotted time finishes (7), participants will tell the rest of the group what they wrote down for each category. If no one has your answer you score a point. If more than one person has the same answer, neither person receives a point. Extra points are awarded for alliterations. For example, if the letter is "M" and the category is "TV Show" the answer "Mickey Mouse" would be worth two points and "The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel" would be worth three points due to the answer having multiple M's in the title.
- Game rules recommend creativity when answering the question. Unique answers or answers that are "in the ballpark" should generally be accepted.
